Love Your Neighbor An Interview with Rabbi Rayna

There is a beautiful kavanah (an intention, a way to focus one's mind and orient one's self) in our morning prayers. The kavanah affirms that we are ready to accept upon ourselves the commandment of our Creator: to love your neighbor as yourself. This provides us a powerful opportunity to begin our days and our prayers with love, and we can never have too much love! Given the many ways we are all connected to each other here in the Lions Gate community, we have a unique and beautiful opportunity to really engage this mitzvah of loving our neighbors as ourselves.

Q. What does this kavanah mean to you?

A. To love your neighbor as yourself is more than just a beautiful sentiment. According to Rabbi Hillel, it's the central tenant of Judaism. But how do you love a neighbor? Is it through respect? Compassion? Empathy? Or is the nature of neighborly love simple kindness? G-d doesn't spell it out. I see G-d as asking us to figure out how to love each and every one of our neighbors, in whatever ways best suit them and our individual relationships.

Q. Why doesn't G-d spell it out? Wouldn't G-d want you to know who you are obliged to "love"?

A. I think we are being directed to widen our circle as far as we are able. I see it as an obligation meant to make the world a better place. G-d gives us the power to choose and engage with whoever we consider our neighbors, and G-d lets us choose how to show love. That we start each day praying on how best to treat our neighbor shows us how much we need to work on it. Each of us has the capacity to truly love our neighbor no matter how different that neighbor may be from us.

Q. "If I am not for myself, who will be for me?" How does that tie into this kayanah?

A. This speaks directly to the last part of the commandment: "as you love yourself." If we cannot love ourselves, if we never make the space or time to tend to our own needs, we will not have the capacity to care for and love others. At the same tine, we also cannot solely focus on our own needs, as the next part of that verse (Pirkei Avot 1:14) states: "If I am only for myself, what am I." If we only focus on ourselves, we lose the something central to what it means to be a person in relationship and community with other people. We must love both ourselves AND our neighbors.

Q. Because Lions Gate is a faith-based community, do you think it's easier for residents to love their neighbors as themselves?



A. I believe that living in a faith-based community serves as a reminder/touchstone to follow the directive of loving your neighbor. G-d has faith in our capacities to strive to do better, and gives us constant opportunities to try and keep trying, even when we have struggled or missed the mark in the past. In many ways, this pandemic seriously tried our commitment to this directive. For many it has created a fear of our neighbor, fear of the transmission of the virus. It has left many of us feeling vulnerable in new and big ways. This mitzvah is perhaps more important now than it has been in other times. It is directing us to push past the fear, anxiety, and exhaustion and to rebuild relationships with our neighbors. We are being challenged to connect once again through love (obviously while still being safe). It's both beautiful and complicated to feel connected and vulnerable with neighbors amid a pandemic. When the world came together to collaborate and create a vaccine to fight COVID, we built connections in ways we never imagined before, just as when we here at Lions Gate pivoted and found new ways to stay connected as a community. The generosity and selflessness of essential workers worldwide and our incredible staff here at Lions Gate was astounding. It's as if the pandemic created a new level of neighborly love. Now the question is, will we be able to sustain it?

Q. Doesn't love ebb and flow? How can any of us sustain a specific level of love for any individual?

A. The expansiveness and versatility of love is important to recognize. First, consider your own needs and capacities. While the obligation to show love doesn't change from day to day, the actual manifestation of love can, and that's OK. Perhaps "love thy neighbor" is more of a sliding scale. "Respect" might be more manageable than "love". "Care" might be more manageable than "support". No one can shoulder the maximum obligation all the time, and I don't think that's what G-d is commanding. G-d is asking that we put in effort every day. Just do your best.


celebrate the end of a beautiful summer together.

Get moving with Nancy Dawson, LIONS GATE'S new Move-In Coordinator!




