On Stage Live, Life & Music of...

Bobby Darin

Started his career as a songwriter for Connie Francis, but after making his own hits, starting with "Splish Splash," came to worldwide fame and success as a singer in his own right. His personal life was filled with events that pushed him into a lengthy time of seclusion, but he made a comeback in the 1970s with great success. His bout with rheumatic fever as a child affected his adult health, and he lived his musical life as though every day might be his last.



Elmer Bernstein


Not related to Leonard Bernstein, but they were good friends, Elmer Bernstein is remembered as one of the most prolific American film composers of the 20th century. He is most remembered for movie music such as "The Ten Commandments," "The Magnificent Seven," "The Great Escape," and "Thoroughly Modern Millie." He was nominated for 14 Oscars, winning one, and won two Golden Globes and an Emmy Award.





Ray Charles

One of the most famous pioneers of the "Soul Music" genre of the 1950s, Ray Charles combined blues, jazz, rhythm and blues and gospel into the music that he recorded for Atlantic Records. He is most remembered for "Georgia On My Mind," recorded in 1960, though his hits crossed barriers on the R&B, Country and Hot Singles charts during the 1960s. He won 18 Grammy Awards, the Kennedy Center Award, National Medal of Arts and a Lifetime Grammy Award.



Gertrude Lawrence

One of the most beloved actresses on Broadway and London Theaters, Lawrence is most remembered for her performance as Anna in Rogers and Hammerstein's "The King and I." Born in England, she made her way through successes in theater with Noel Coward plays and musicals, and with early musicals by the Gershwin brothers. She is also famously remembered for her experience with psychoanalysis and her friendship with author Daphne du Maurier.

Each city is rich in history, culture, and diverse landscapes. We will talk about what makes each place unique and visit inside many of the iconic landmarks of the region.

North American Explorations

Join us as we explore our diverse continent through a combined historical and geographic approach. First, we will examine the formation of the continent through the dynamics of plate tectonics and erosion. Highlights will be the Appalachians, New Jersey and the East Coast, the Rocky Mountains, Panama, California, Bay of Fundy, and Alaska.

In the next session, we will examine the incredible time period called the Great Ice Age and its effects on our continent and the fauna and human migration which were affected by this climatic change. Highlights will be: the Great Lakes, Alaska, New York City, the Great Salt Lake, Hudson Bay and other areas which show evidence of North America of long ago. Grab your compass and snowshoes as we prepare for this voyage of discovery!

"How Did We Get Here" the Age of Discovery

Ever wonder who is known in history as the "Mother of Thanksgiving." Have you ever thought about why Hanukkah involves eating jelly donuts? These and many other interesting questions are explored in this timely holiday program. Starting with the real story of the Pilgrims, we explore the myths and traditions of Thanksgiving. We tell the tale of which president began the tradition of pardoning the turkey, how the Thanksgiving parades began, and which President decided to change the day of the holiday.

Then we look at the interesting true history of Hanukkah, many of Hanukkah's traditions, and the real story behind the spinning dreidel..

History's Mysteries of American History

People who became food; How much is our money really worth? Is there really an Uncle Sam? Did Teddy Roosevelt truly lead a cavalry charge up San Juan Hill? Did American cowboys actually wear ten-gallon hats?" Many of these stories and legends have seeped into the story of American history and are repeated as fact in schools, history books and on televised history programs. But are these stories actually true or are they American folklore and distorted or altered to provide a more interesting account? Historical knowledge is often imperfect or erroneously portrayed by myths, half-truths, general omissions, or even total fabrication..

Ethics in Modern Life

An ongoing series of discussions on "Ethics in Modern Life."

We will first discuss the ethics of a situation where someone behaves badly, the event is captured on video, and the video goes viral online. If the person's bad behavior happened on their own time, is it ethical for their employer to fire them for the behavior? We will then explore ethical issues that confront museums and other nonprofit institutions, including the question of whether they should accept donations from individuals or companies that made their money in unsavory ways. American Composers of the 20th centu

On December 9, 1956, Dimitri Tiomkin stumped the panel on "What's My Line." 65 years later, Ira will focus the December lectures on the life and music of Dmitri Tiomkin. He was the first film composer to win an Academy award for best original song: "Do Not Forsake Me Oh My Darling", while winning an Oscar for the same film "High Noon." In total, Tiomkin won four academy awards.

Famous Jewish Personalities in Politics, Science, Music and Art.

Marc Chagall

Chagall was a Russian-French artist whose diverse modern styles and formats including painting, drawing, book illustrations, stained glass, stage sets, ceramics, tapestries and fine art prints. He has often been called the "quintessential Jewish artist of the twentieth century."





Maimonides

A medieval Sephardic Jewish philosopher, Maimonides became one of the most prolific and influential Torah scholars of the middle Ages. He was an astronomer and physician, who became the personal physician to Saladin. His works and analyses have received both high praise and great controversy over the centuries from scholars in Europe, the Middle East, Africa, Eastern Europe and the Americas.

Benjamin Disraeli

Served twice as the Prime Minister of Great Britain, and was instrumental in the creation of the British Conservative Party. He is remembered famously for his political relationship with William Gladstone, and for his part in the glorification of the British Empire. He is the only person of Jewish birth to have served as Prime Minister of England.

AI Jolson

Famously remembered for his performances in blackface, Jolson was the first performer to be seen in a major motion "talking" picture – The Jazz Singer. He billed himself as "The World's Greatest Entertainer," and was the highest paid performer of the 1920's. During WWII and the Korean War, he was the first star to entertain the troops overseas. His singing style helped to promote jazz and blues to mainstream America, in spite of many criticisms that he became the shameful poster boy for blackface


Textiles in Ancient Egypt Instructor: Stephen "Dr. Steve" Phillips, Ph.D.


Textiles in Ancient Egypt - The ancient Egyptians were renowned master weavers, even in their own time. Large quantities of linen were required for things we can still relate to, such as clothing and household uses, as well as for things we associate with ancient Egypt specifically, such as cloth for use as mummy wrappings.

Archaeological evidence for ancient Egyptian textile production exists in the form of artifacts as well as in tomb paintings and carved reliefs. What did the ancient









Egyptians use to make cloth, how did they make it, and how was it used? This fascinating lecture brings ancient Egyptian textiles to life, including images from 3,500 year-old tombs, of royal mummy wrappings (and unwrapping), the world's oldest dresses, as well as some of the world's oldest tunics - the "t-shirt of antiquity."
