

Daily life includes three delicious kosher meals served in a warm, restaurant-style setting, weekly housekeeping, and maintenance-free living.

One of the things that makes Lions Gate so special is the incredible variety of classes, programs, and activities designed to nurture the mind, body, and spirit — available to all residents, including those in Assisted Living. We make a concerted effort to ensure that our Assisted Living residents have the best selection of programming in the tri-state area.

There's Chair Zumba, yoga, baking, Broadway classes, Drama Club, a Walking Club, and the surprisingly competitive Ping Pong with Dave. There are, quite literally, too many to list.

During October, residents enjoyed High Holiday services, weekly presentations by Stuart Liss on a variety of celebrities, and a festive hayride at Johnson's Corner Farm. November has just as

much fun, with History Unraveled (where the presenter dresses in the era being discussed), a Veterans Day Pinning Ceremony and Zentangle, a brand new, mentally stimulating art class.

"We're not content with the status quo and are constantly looking for new activities, programs, and classes, as well as ways to bring technology to our residents," said Jennifer Quinn, Director of Activities for Assisted Living and Memory Care. "For example, we recently purchased an electronic, self-shuffling, and dealing mahjong table. The residents love it!"

Our goal is to keep Assisted Living residents active, interested, and excited about classes and activities. Participating with others fosters friendship and a true sense of community. As Jennifer noted, "It's not like they attend programs just for the sake of attending them. They attend because they want to. Because they enjoy them."

Ethics In Modern Life with Sarah Rosenson

At Lions Gate, learning never stops. One of the classes that captures that spirit is the very popular Ethics in Modern Life, taught by Sarah Rosenson. A lawyer with an undergraduate degree in Government and a master's in Jewish Studies, Sarah brings a great mix of intellect, experience, and curiosity to every session.

Sarah has taught at Lions Gate for more than five years, and her ethics class is extremely popular. Noting that the residents are active participants in the class, Sarah said, "I don't give lectures. I lead discussions, and I try to pick topics that people are going to be interested in. The whole hour is very, very interactive and participatory."

The class, held twice a month, explores questions that challenge the residents' minds and moral compasses. She noted that, recently, topics included "Should billionaires exist?... What ethical

issues arise when people gamble on sports? And artificial intelligence and how it can reanimate people."

What makes the course special, she said, is the perspective the residents bring. "You can have the same topic with a group of high school students or a group of seniors," she explained, "but the seniors have much more life experience to bring to the discussion...It's just a completely different worldview."

That wisdom, she would like to believe, keeps the conversation going well after class ends. Sarah continued, "I hope they're getting mentally, intellectually, and ethically challenged in a way that's compelling and interesting. I hope they continue the conversations at lunch or when they talk with friends and relatives."

For Sarah, teaching at Lions Gate is pure joy. "It's all the good parts of teaching with none of the bad," she said. "I get to have conversations with interesting people about interesting topics. It's phenomenal."

Art History & Appreciation With Steve Pollack

Steve Pollack has worked with Lions Gate for 18 years, initially as an entertainer and now as an instructor for several different Lions Gate University classes.
On Sunday afternoons, he teaches Art History & Appreciation – in-depth studies of art periods and movements.

The class was originally focused on individual artists but soon evolved into a journey through art history. As Steve explained, "People were interested in the artists, but many didn't understand how they fit into history. So I suggested we start with the art movements first — and then explore the artists within them." The response was a resounding yes.

Steve structured the class to move chronologically through history, ultimately, "looking at how the artists fit into the political, social, philosophical,

and scientific times of their lives."

Describing his teaching method, Steve explains, "My style is completely interactive and probably provocative." The goal is to spark and keep residents thinking. "I don't think of myself as being there to dump information. I'm there to help people think about questions like, 'Why did particular artists paint for the French Revolution and then for Napoleon? What does that say about their political integrity?"

Steve enjoys teaching the class and appears to get as much from the residents as he gives to them. In the end, it's mutual. Steve concluded, "I'm really grateful, you know, because it has turned out to be a community that has given me a lot of love. And I feel really lucky. It's blossomed into something that I would never have predicted."

At Lions Gate, there is a lifelong love of learning. Art History & Appreciation is just one example of how residents continue to grow, question, and discover something new every day.
